




Angles	Members of a Germanic people who invaded the island of Britain in the 5 th Century.

Jutes	A member of people who invaded Britain alongside the Angles and the Saxons in the 5 th century.			<input type="checkbox"/> Urban life in Britain rapidly declined, following the withdrawal of Rome. Many people moved out of the towns, which fell into a state of disrepair.	<h3>Important</h3>
artefacts	An object made by a human being, typically one of cultural or historical interest	<input type="checkbox"/> The Anglo-Saxons used both corporal and capital punishment. They regularly used courts where royal appointees would hear cases and decide on a suitable punishment.	<p>The Anglo-Saxons were a mix of tribes from Germany, Denmark and the Netherlands. The three biggest were the Angles, the Saxons and the Jutes.</p>		
Romans	People of the Roman civilization who lived from 8 th century BC to 5 th century AD	<input type="checkbox"/> During the Anglo-Saxon period, Britain was divided into territories. The borders of these territories closely reflect current borders of England, Scotland and Wales.			<p>The Angles, Saxons and Jutes were opportunistic and invaded and settle in Britain, when Roman forces were recalled to the continent to help defend Rome itself.</p>
shields	A broad piece of metal, or suitable material, held by straps or a handle, used as protection against blows or missiles	<input type="checkbox"/> By 600 the Anglo-Saxons had established a number of independent kingdoms within territories that had once been Roman. For example, there was a kingdom of Wessex, which comes from the west Saxons; Sussex is where the south Saxons lived; and perhaps the most famous of them, Northumbria.			
polytheism	The belief or worship of more than god	<input type="checkbox"/> The Vikings invaded Britain at the end of the 8 th century. The Anglo-Saxons and the Vikings constantly battled over territory. This continued until the 11 th century, when King Sweyn of Denmark invaded England and took charge.			
pagan	A person holding religious beliefs other than those of the main world religions.
