



New Covid-19 Isolation Guidlines

As you will be aware, schools are currently no longer required to operate a strict 'bubble' system. Before the summer, if any child or member of staff within a bubble tested positive for Covid then the whole group would be required to self-isolate. This rule has now changed.

Your child is now only required to stay at home if they have Covid 19 symptoms, are awaiting a PCR test result or have tested positive for Covid 19.

Therefore, even if we do experience limited positive cases, all children, without symptoms, even those who may have had contact with a positive case, should attend school at all times. This also applies to siblings in the same household.

Year 1 Bikeability

Year 1 Bikeability will be taking place on Monday 13th September, children will be provided with bikes and helmets so there is no requirement for parents/carers to send them in. Your child will be coming home with a consent form today, please ensure you complete the consent form and return it to school with your child Monday morning. If we do not receive a consent form your child will not be able to take part.

Reminder of School Times

Thank you to the vast majority of families who have adapted to the return of normal start and end of school day routines. For those who have arrived late at any point this week can I remind you that the school gates are open from 8.45am -8.55am in the morning. Any arrivals after this time will need to sign in at the school office but please aim to adapt your morning routines to ensure that this is not necessary. At the end of the day, all classes now finish school at 3.15pm.

PE Kits

Please ensure that your children attend PE days in school wearing correct school kit. This year, we are also asking children to wear their school jumper or cardigan so they look smart. Football kits and other branded sportswear are not permitted. When the weather turns colder children are allowed to wear black or dark blue, non-branded tracksuits.

Twenty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Christ Jesus, you call us to follow you. May we have the courage to answer that call, even in the most difficult times.

In this Sunday's gospel, we hear about how it is not always easy to follow Jesus or to accept what God wants to happen in our lives. Even Peter, one of Jesus's disciples found it difficult at times.

Gospel: Mark 8:27-35

Then Jesus and his disciples went away to the villages near Caesarea Philippi. On the way he asked them, "Tell me, who do people say I am?"

"Some say that you are John the Baptist," they answered; "others say that you are Elijah, while others say that you are one of the prophets."

"What about you?" he asked them. "Who do you say I am?" Peter answered, "You are the Messiah." Then Jesus ordered them, "Do not tell anyone about me."

Then Jesus began to teach his disciples: "The Son of Man must suffer much and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the teachers of the Law. He will be put to death, but three days later he will rise to life." He made this very clear to them. So Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But Jesus turned around, looked at his disciples, and rebuked Peter. "Get away from me, Satan," he said. "Your thoughts don't come from God but from human nature!" Then Jesus called the crowd and his disciples to him. "If any of you want to come with me," he told them, "you must forget yourself, carry your cross, and follow me. For if you want to save your own life, you will lose it; but if you lose your life for me and for the gospel, you will save it.


Peter believed that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God. He had faith in Jesus. But then Jesus started to tell the disciples about what would happen to him. That he would suffer and be killed, but that after three days he would rise again. Peter struggled to believe all this - he did not want to believe that his friend, the Son of God, would suffer and die.

Peter felt afraid that Jesus might leave them. And he wanted to protect Jesus from harm because he cared about him.

It is sometimes hard to do what God wants us to do, just like it was for Peter, because we are afraid, and we do not want to get hurt, or for those that we love to be hurt.

Jesus tells us that it will not always be easy to follow him, but that we must have courage, because God will always be with us.

What will you do over the coming week to show that you follow Jesus?



God of light, as we try to follow you, give us the courage to reach out and help others, so that we can build a fairer world. Amen.
