Season of Creation We have had such a busy and meaningful week at St John's as we have worked collectively to raise an awareness and an understanding of issues linked to climate change. As you know, Pope Francis has called on Catholics to take action for our common home during the Season of Creation, which lasts from the 1st September until 4<sup>th</sup> October (the Feast of St Francis.) Our Holy Father is encouraging each of us to question the way we live and to

turn 'towards lifestyles that are simpler and more respectful to the environment.' This has been the focus for our activities this week and we've all been impressed by our children's knowledge, understanding and passion about all issues relating to the damage we are causing to our beautiful Earth, gifted to us by God.

Children in Reception kicked off the week by litter picking in our school grounds, we really appreciated how lovely our school site looked after their hard work. When sharing their views, they said:

'We need to keep school tidy to keep all the animals safe.' And

'We need to look after our world.'

Year Two also went litter picking to ensure that our local environment was looking at its best.







# Season of Creation

Year One focused on their class saint, St Francis of Assisi. He is well known for his love of the earth and for animals. They decorated their outdoor 'saints tree' and made a beautiful image of St Francis for us all to enjoy. Their efforts reminded us of the words of St Francis himself, written in hi Canticle of Creation:

O Most High, all-powerful, good Lord God, to you belong praise, glory, honour and all blessing. Be praised, my Lord, for all your creation and especially for our Brother Sun, who brings us the day and the light; he is strong and shines magnificently. O Lord, we think of you when we look at him. There was a strong focus on the 'God Who Speaks' national scripture campaign; some beautiful flower displays and the opportunity to view a relic of St Jerome, the patron saint of translators – the person who first translated the Bible. We really enjoyed our visit and welcomed the opportunity to appreciate the beauty of nature and reflect upon what we must do to ensure this beauty is preserved for generations to come.



Ren and Dylan had a brilliant time at St. Anthony's School. They worked collaboratively with the children in our MAC family to use their poetry to create a hymn.







## **Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time**

God of love, strengthen our faith and help us to make the right choices even when it is difficult.

This Sunday, we will reflect on how believing in Jesus can sometimes mean we have to make hard choices. As we are currently focusing on Pope Francis' Season of Creation, we will also think about the choices we need to make to protect and care for the beautiful planet earth, which is our home.

Gospel: Mark 9:38-43, 45, 47-48

John said to him, "Teacher, we saw a man who was driving out demons in your name, and we told him to stop, because he doesn't belong to our group."

"Do not try to stop him," Jesus told them, "because no one who performs a miracle in my name will be able soon afterwards to say evil things about me. For whoever is not against us is for us. I assure you that anyone who gives you a drink of water because you belong to me will certainly receive his reward.

"If anyone should cause one of these little ones to lose his faith in me, it would be better for that person to have a large millstone tied around his neck and be thrown into the sea. So if your hand makes you lose your faith, cut it off! It is better for you to enter life without a hand than to keep both hands and go off to hell, to the fire that never goes out.

And if your foot makes you lose your faith, cut it off! It is better for you to enter life without a foot than to keep both feet and be thrown into hell.

And if your eye makes you lose your faith, take it out! It is better for you to enter the Kingdom of God with only one eye than to keep both eyes and be thrown into hell. There 'the worms that eat them never die, and the fire that burns them is never put out.'

Jesus told the disciples that anyone who was not against him, who was not his enemy, was his friend. And He said that anyone who treated people well because they followed him would be loved by him and be rewarded in heaven.

Jesus also has a message that might be a bit scary or confusing as he told the disciples that they should cut off their hand or foot rather than losing faith in him. Now of course, we can't really go around cutting off parts of our body but Jesus is saying that if we are going to be his followers, if we are going to have faith and believe in him, sometimes we will have to do things that are very hard.

Just as Jesus cares for us all, he asks us to care for one another. This means being kind and generous and friendly and helpful. It can mean making sure everyone has enough food to eat, and clean water to drink. But it can also mean a bit more than that, like sticking up for what is right and what we believe in. We might have to choose to do the right thing when others are doing something wrong. We might need to speak out when we see something happening that we



God's wonderful gift of creation has been given to all people to share, both now and in the future. We need to speak up now to make sure it looked after now and preserved for future generations.

Generous God, we thank you for creating such a beautiful world. May we do all that we can to protect it for all people today and in the future. Amen.
