our petitions on Climate Change.



Science Superstars

Year 3 have been testing the durability and permeability of different rocks. To test permeability, we added a few drops of water using the pipette onto the rock and observed whether it absorbed. We then used a coin to test how durable the rocks are.

Finally, we tested the density of different rocks using a large container full of water to decide which rocks have higher and which have lower density.

Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

God of light, show us how we can answer your call. Inspire us to share all that we have with others, so that all people around the world may live free from poverty.

In this Sunday's gospel, we hear about how Jesus asks a rich young man to sell his nice things and to give all his money to people who are poor.

Gospel: Mark 10:17-30

As Jesus was starting on his way again, a man ran up, knelt before him, and asked him, "Good Teacher, what must I do to receive eternal life?"

"Why do you call me good?" Jesus asked him. "No one is good except God alone.¹⁹ You know the commandments: 'Do not commit murder; do not commit adultery; do not steal; do not accuse anyone falsely; do not cheat; respect your father and your mother.'"

"Teacher," the man said, "ever since I was young, I have obeyed all these commandments."

Jesus looked straight at him with love and said, "You need only one thing. Go and sell all you have and give the money to the poor, and you will have riches in heaven; then come and follow me." When the man heard this, gloom spread over his face, and he went away sad, because he was very rich. Jesus looked round at his disciples and said to them, "How hard it will be for rich people to enter the Kingdom of God!"

The disciples were shocked at these words, but Jesus went on to say, "My children, how hard it is to enter the Kingdom of God! ²⁵ It is much harder for a rich person to enter the Kingdom of God than for a camel to go through the eye of a needle." At this the disciples were completely amazed and asked one another, "Who, then, can be saved?"

Jesus looked straight at them and answered, "This is impossible for human beings but not for God; everything is possible for God." Then Peter spoke up, "Look, we have left everything and followed you."

"Yes," Jesus said to them, "and I tell you that anyone who leaves home or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields for me and for the gospel, ³⁰ will receive much more in this present age. He will receive a hundred times more houses, brothers, sisters, mothers, children, and fields—and persecutions as well; and in the age to come he will receive eternal life. In this story, losus reminded the man of the Tan Commandments, that he should not kill, should not story or tell lies, and that

In this story, Jesus reminded the man of the Ten Commandments, that he should not kill, should not steal or tell lies, and that he must respect his parents. The man said that he had kept all of these commandments since he was young. And so Jesus gave him an extra challenge by asking him to sell his nice things and to give all his money to people who are poor. Once he had done this, Jesus said, that the man could follow him.

This is exactly what Jesus asks of us. That if we have more than enough, we share what we have with others. That way all people in the world would be able to have the things that they need. We are not asked to give up everything but if we all contribute something, no matter how small, imagine what a difference that could make.



Generous God, we thank you for all the gifts that you have given us. Teach us to share these gifts with others, so all people may have enough. Amen.
