FREE Maths Webinar for Parents/Carers

FREE Webinar: Help Your Child DO Maths, Even If You DON'T

Parents know how important it is for their child to be confident in maths, but many feel worried by their own struggles with it.

Solihull local authority is pleased to be working with Dr Rosemary Russell who will be delivering a free online event for parents on Wednesday 17th November 2021, 7:30-8:30 pm.

In this Microsoft Teams session, Rosemary will show how any parent or care-giver (even those who think they are 'rubbish' at maths) can help give their child a can-do attitude to it. Based on her latest book, 'Help Your Child DO Maths, Even If You DON'T', Rosemary addresses how parents can build up their child's confidence and give them the positive attitude that is so important to learning the subject. Rosemary will share 10 things from her book that ANYONE can do to help their child with maths - without doing any maths at all. So, whatever your own feelings about maths, you can help!

Class Activities - KS1

But key is that you have a say and give us feedback and that we listen to what you tell us.

The group will commence meeting during the 1st week of November and thereafter during the 1st week of each month.

Dads are important too!



BUILDING STRONGER RELATIONSHIPS WITH YOUR CHILD

Bonding and attachment is the way we describe the powerful development of feelings that you have for your child.



Some dads may express this as their 'super-power', giving them an ability to move mountains as soon as their new baby arrives. Others may find it takes a little longer to have the same emotions.

It is important to remember that dads get tired too and that is perfectly normal, so here are some tips to help promote a healthy relationship between you and your baby whether you're feeling over the moon or overwhelmed:

- Lots of cuddles and skin to skin contact is best it's a myth that babies get spoilt by too many cuddles.
- Talk to your baby, tell them about your day, respond to their sounds, read stories and sing songs; they don't
 care if you sing out of tune and neither should you!
- Using a sling to carry your baby benefits them due to the close contact between you both; it will help to soothe them as they will feel safe and secure. This feeling also helps their brain grow and develop.
- Play regularly, have fun and enjoy spending time together. Give your child your attention and try not to be
 distracted by other things. Set aside some one-on-one time, maybe to go for a walk or play a game together,
 even try some cooking. Try and remember that every child should feel like an only child, even if it is only for 15
 mins a day.

Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

God of healing power, help us to see what is not right or fair in our world. Open our eyes to see the changes we can make so that everyone can have hope for a fairer future.

In this Sunday's gospel, we hear about how Jesus helped a blind man called Bartimaeus to see again. Sometimes we see things that are not fair or right, but it can be a lot harder to see how to change these things.

Gospel: Mark 10:46-52

They came to Jericho, and as Jesus was leaving with his disciples and a large crowd, a blind beggar named Bartimaeus son of Timaeus was sitting by the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout, "Jesus! Son of David! Take pity on me!"

Many of the people scolded him and told him to be quiet. But he shouted even more loudly, "Son of David, take pity on me!"

Jesus stopped and said, "Call him."

So they called the blind man. "Cheer up!" they said. "Get up, he is calling you."

He threw off his cloak, jumped up, and came to Jesus.

"What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus asked him.

"Teacher," the blind man answered, "I want to see again."

"Go," Jesus told him, "your faith has made you well."

At once he was able to see and followed Jesus on the road.

For those of us who are not blind or visually impaired, we might take our gift of sight for granted. We might not realise just how wonderful the trees, birds, flowers and people we see are, because we see them every day.

We might also have times when we try to ignore things that we see, or we pretend that we can't see them. For instance, we might pretend not to see the toys we have left scattered all over the floor when we are asked to tidy up. We might ignore the homeless person that we see asking for money.

Sometimes we know what we have seen isn't fair or right, but we don't know what to do about it. It can be easier to pretend that we haven't seen the problem than to work out what to do to make it better. We can all play a part in trying to build a fairer world, just as we did together during the Season of Creation. We can tell others and help them to see that there is a problem, but also that there are ways to make our world a fairer place. If we all work together, you and me, world leaders and big businesses, and people from all around the world, we will see what difference we can really make.



Christ Jesus, help us to see what we can do to make a change, so that our world may be a fairer place for all. Amen.
