## A message from Mr Gallagher

Yesterday we celebrated the feast of St Patrick; wearing green to raise money for the people of Ukraine. Saint Patrick was born in England, but when he was a teenager, he was captured by Irish pirates who took him to Ireland as a slave. After six years, Saint Patrick escaped and returned to England and his family.


When Saint Patrick became a priest, he travelled back to Ireland as a missionary so that he could teach the people about God. He used examples to explain the mysteries of the faith in simple ways. Saint Patrick famously compared the Trinity to a shamrock. He said that the shamrock has three leaves, but it is only one plant. In the same way, God is three persons - Father, Son, and Holy Spirit - but one God.

God used Saint Patrick's kidnapping to convert the Irish people. In our lives, God uses the bad times to bring about a good we do not always see. We must be patient and trust Him and always try to look for good in others and in all situations.

important role parents/carers have and want to support this in every way we can, and we hope this scheme will really motivate children to read at home.

The scheme is very simple. All children have to do is read their school reading book at home and have their Reading Record Book signed by an adult. We recognise the importance of all reading experiences, like bedtime stories, but for the purposes of our scheme we only reward when children read their school reading book. The Reading Record book will be checked and a stamp given when a child has read at home 3 times (only one stamp will be given for 3 separate days, even if the book has been read more than once in a day). When children have received 8 stamps they will earn their first reward, a Red Ted teddy bear. They can then start working towards their next reward, a golden token which enables them to choose a book from our book vending machine and badges for their Red Ted bear.

Our RED Teds are ready and waiting to make friends, so make sure you're reading every day!



**British Science Week** 

Early Years have had a very busy science week! We read the story 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' and then received a special delivery of caterpillars.

We need to help care for them in our classroom whilst they grow. We can't wait to watch all four stages of their life cycle before we release them into the springtime weather! We have also made our very own mini beast area so we can observe lots of other interesting mini beasts!









For Science Week, Year 2 have been learning about electricity. We have been

constructing electrical circuits and investigating materials that make good electrical conductors and good insulators.





Year 1 children have been learning the names of animals and their young. Sorting and grouping the different types of animals such as reptiles, amphibians, mammals, birds, fish and invertebrates. Through learning about what the different animals eat, the children now understand the difference between carnivore, herbivore and omnivore eating animals.

Year 4 have been learning about the water cycle. We used play dough to create our own water cycle and presented it to our class, making use of all of the scientific vocabulary we have learnt.



For our topic on Forces, Year 5 have worked all week to investigate friction using our shoes, air-resistance using paper spinners and buoyancy with classroom objects floating or sinking. We used I-pads to take timings, recorded data in tables and diagrams and related our work to the real world. We also watched Neil Armstrong dropping objects on the moon.



# **Year 5 Fundraising**


For part of our Catholic Social Teaching, we are intending to raise money to support those who are displaced.




'The Island that Didn't Exist' by Joe Wilson

### **Third Sunday of Lent**

Forgiving God, we thank you for the love and care that you show for us all. Help us to grow in that love, and to do all that we can to help each other to live free from poverty and hunger. Amen.

In this Sunday's gospel, Jesus tells a story about a tree that did not bear any fruit and all the things that the gardener planned to try to make it grow better. People are like trees, they need certain things to grow and be healthy too.

Gospel: Luke 13:1-9

At that time some people were there who told Jesus about the Galileans whom Pilate had killed while they were offering sacrifices to God. Jesus answered them, "Because those Galileans were killed in that way, do you think it proves that they were worse sinners than all the other Galileans? No indeed! And I tell you that if you do not turn from your sins, you will all die as they did. What about those eighteen people in Siloam who were killed when the tower fell on them? Do you suppose this proves that they were worse than all the other people living in Jerusalem? No indeed! And I tell you that if you do not turn from your sins, you will all die as they did."

Then Jesus told them this parable: "There was once a man who had a fig tree growing in his vineyard. He went looking for figs on it but found none. So he said to his gardener, 'Look, for three years I have been coming here looking for figs on this fig tree, and I haven't found any. Cut it down! Why should it go on using up the soil?' But the gardener answered, 'Leave it alone, sir, just one more year; I will dig round it and put in some manure. Then if the tree bears figs next year, so much the better; if not, then you can have it cut down.'"

Just like the fig tree, people need the right conditions to live their lives well too. Everyone needs enough food and water to stay healthy and strong. How we treat other people can also help them to grow and develop or stop them from doing so. We all have a responsibility to look after each other: our friends, our family and even people that we haven't met around the world.

Even though there is enough food for everyone in the world, not everyone has enough to eat. Some of us don't have clean running water. Some of us don't have anywhere safe to live. Some of us don't have the chance to go to school. Some of us are treated badly because of what we look like, where we come from.

When the good things that God has given us are not shared fairly with everyone, those who do not have enough cannot grow and build a better future.

The fig tree in Jesus' story is supposed to share its fruit with the man who planted it, but it is not doing what it is supposed to. Sometimes we are a bit like the fig tree. We do not share as well as we could. God gives us the chance to change, to share what we have and to do all that we can to make sure that all people have the things that they need to live.



What will you do this Lent, to help make a change to our world?

Creator God, you gave us a world full of wonderful things. May we share these fairly with each other so all people have the chance to grow and live happy lives. Amen.
