
October - The Month of the Holy Rosary

By tradition, the Catholic Church dedicates each month of the year to a certain devotion. The month of October is dedicated to the holy Rosary as the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary falls on October 7th. The best way to celebrate the month is, of course, to pray the Rosary.

The Rosary draws its mysteries from the New Testament, with each decade referring to an event in the life of Jesus and Mary. The Mysteries of the Rosary give us "thumbnails" of the life of Christ and his Mother.

The Joyful Mysteries are taken mostly from Saint Luke's Gospel in the New Testament. They involve the joyful events of Jesus' childhood.

The Luminous Mysteries bring a deeper understanding to the public life of Jesus. They fill in the blanks between the childhood of Jesus and His suffering and death on the cross.



The Sorrowful Mysteries remind us of how much Jesus loves us. They recall how He suffered and died just for us.

The Glorious Mysteries tell us what happened after Jesus died-His Resurrection, the descent of the Holy Spirit and the love Jesus had for his Mother.

We will be praying the Rosary together in school and have a series of events planned throughout October. This could also be a chance for you to join together, as a family, to pray the Rosary at home.



Class Activities - KS2



This week in year 3, we have been learning about our bones and the job they have within our body.

Children created their own skeleton by drawing round each other and labelled all of the bones they could remember! They had lots of fun being scientists!

So year 4 were super scientists and took part in a digestion experiment. They couldn't believe their eyes. They thought about what they needed to be eating as the nutrients go into their bloodstream.





In our English work this week we have been putting our justification skills to the test by writing in character as The Purple Lady. We had some amazing speeches produced and even some performed!

We are very fortunate to have our music sessions taught by Solihull music service and we have had a great time learning about percussion.

Year 6 used freeze frames to re-enact an Old Testament Story: Cain and Abel. They thought about how jealousy can consume us as people and control our actions.

In writing, the children looked at Standard English, applying it into their writing by using the passive voice.


'In the Dark' by Lemony Snicket

Twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

God of light, help us to see that even with the smallest amount of faith, we can do anything you ask of us. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

In this Sunday's gospel, Jesus tells us how powerful faith is. How, if we have faith we can do anything we want to, even if at first it seems impossible.

Gospel: Luke 17:5-10

The apostles said to the Lord, "Make our faith greater."

The Lord answered, "If you had faith as big as a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, 'Pull yourself up by the roots and plant yourself in the sea!' and it would obey you.

"Suppose one of you has a servant who is ploughing or looking after the sheep. When he comes in from the field, do you tell him to hurry and eat his meal? Of course not! Instead, you say to him, 'Get my supper ready, then put on your apron and wait on me while I eat and drink; after that you may have your meal.' The servant does not deserve thanks for obeying orders, does he? It is the same with you; when you have done all you have been told to do, say, 'We are ordinary servants; we have only done our duty.'"

Jesus said that even if his apostles had faith like a mustard seed they could tell a mulberry tree to move from where it is in the ground and plant itself in the sea.

A mustard seed is really tiny. So, Jesus is saying that even if we only have a small amount of faith we can do amazing things. Even if we can't move trees we might be able to make big changes to the world around us.

We all have times when things are really difficult. It can be hard to keep our faith in God at these times. Even the disciples had moments when they did not think that they had enough faith.

Yet this reading gives us hope – that even if we just have a tiny little bit of faith, with God's help, we can make real changes to the world around us.



God of life, give us the courage to try to make a change to our world, no matter how small, and the faith to know that with you all things are possible. Amen.
