Sadly, Mrs Banks leaves our school community today. Her children have all attended St. John's and she herself has worked here for almost ten years.


We thank her for her dedicated service and hard work and, in particular for the kindness and patience that she has shared with so many of our children.

Throughout January we are offering 10% Off Bags and Clothing to Schools with extended credit until April 2023.


We will also be running a sale to parents of our parent online schools at the end of the month. Make sure they sign up for more information.







For our younger readers...


'The Day You Begin' by Jacqueline Woodson

Baptism of the Lord

Living God, we give thanks for water which gives us life. We pray that all your children around the world may have clean water to drink.

In this Sunday's gospel, we hear about how Jesus is baptised by John in the waters of the river Jordan. Water is a very important part of baptism, but it is also really important in our lives for other reasons. We all need water to live.

Gospel: Matthew 3:13-17

At that time Jesus arrived from Galilee and came to John at the Jordan to be baptized by him. But John tried to make him change his mind. "I ought to be baptized by you," John said, "and yet you have come to me!"

But Jesus answered him, "Let it be so for now. For in this way we shall do all that God requires." So John agreed.

As soon as Jesus was baptized, he came up out of the water. Then heaven was opened to him, and he saw the Spirit of God coming down like a dove and alighting on him. Then a voice came from heaven, "This is my own dear Son, with whom I am pleased."

John baptised Jesus in the river, and there was a voice from heaven that said something very important, confirming that he is the Son of God.

Water itself is very important. It is used in baptism to show that we are starting a new life with God. It symbolises cleansing and the removal of sins too.

Sadly, we waste huge amounts of water, which is such a precious, life giving commodity. Often, when we brush our teeth we will leave the tap running. We might make a drink, forget about it and throw it away later.

There are many people in the world who do not have clean water to drink. Many will have to travel for miles to collect enough water to stay alive.

When we think about living simply, let's make every effort not to waste water unnecessarily, this is such an easy thing to do and helps us to consider how we can make a fairer world for everyone.



God of life, help us to act so that no one goes thirsty and all people around the world have enough water for all their needs. Amen.
